"Re-member the World"

What I really wanted to call this speech was "Remembering the World". At some point, we have to consciously "member" it. That is what we are doing, in real time, "membering the future". We must however do it with humility, not hubris.

What are we trying to solve?

What are we trying to solve? What is the actual problem? We need a broad spectrum of talent, and a multiplicity of ideas to address these questions. If everyone was a physics major at MIT then a Harvard MBA, while we might all be wonderful brilliant people, our conceptual framework would still be too narrow.

Sustainability has become a placeholder word, it should not be a proxy for "green". If anything, it's a proxy for "risk".

How do we reframe "sustainability" to engage companies and institutions? Sustainability SHOULD be seen as good sound management for companies. Yet it is much more than that.

We need to ask different questions. We have a tendency to look for THE ANSWER, there often is no single right answer. There are decisions to be made, and those decisions have consequences. We need to build in enough flexibility without such a high political penalty that we can walk away from poor or no longer effective choices, thus allowing for more experimentation.

Transparency is key

We have a tendency to try to make problems smaller; but sometimes we need to blow them up and make them bigger. How do we make that mental shift and practice more innovation?

Interface's first CSR - as distinct from environmental - report was in 1997. The legal team was nervous, saying 'you can't do that'-a tri-fold of 'take/make/waste'. Ray Anderson said "That's what we're going to do. We're going to tell the truth. Transparency is the key. If we tell the truth, others will tell our story."

The best way to cross the water

We must rethink product design. Western history and western society are amazing. Consider the things we have done and the world we have built, especially indoor plumbing! But since 1969, when we first saw the image of our beautiful BLUE planet, the earth, from the moon our perspective has changed.... We need to work with these different frontiers.

Yasmin spoke about building bridges and crossing the water. Our engineering schools are great at producing people who know how to literally build bridges. The building part of the equation- we've got it! Sometimes though we need to step back and answer the question of how to get across the river. There may be instances where a canoe or boat is all that is needed yet we keep building bridges.....

Accelerate the path to sustainability

We must rethink our world. Consider indigenous dance where the dancers fall into gravity – they don't work against it--working with nature and learning from it. We need to remake our world as one where justice and equity matter and everyone has value and the opportunity to provide input. By re-membering, resetting and re-framing our world we will accelerate the path to sustainability.

The future beckons, this must be done. Its brilliance is shining and is a reflection of the youth in waiting. New language is actually old. We have the cultural and infrastructure knowledge. What we need now is the WILL.

It's not a green economy; it's a new economy. We've been clumsy at talking across government, social and corporate lines. Civil society has forced itself into arenas and rooms where it did not seem to belong. We all belong, and we all belong everywhere. All issues are for all of us. The readjustment is required of those who have been in power, in towers--of ivory or penthouse suites. And this readjustment will be beneficial for all too.

Undivide and reunite

It's time to get out of the silos, undivided, and reunite ourselves. This does not mean that we should lose our areas of expertise. It means integrating them, not losing them. Embracing new ways of doing things that un-divide and re-unite us to proactively create positive change for our planet, our people and our economy. We can do that. We must.

Maya Angelou said, "One isn't necessarily born with courage, but one is born with potential. Without courage, we cannot practice any other virtue with consistency. We can't be kind, truthful, merciful, generous, or honest."

Be brave enough to ask the questions, the simple, silly and hard questions. Encourage others to speak truth and to be brave. Because this moment and what we do today matters. What we do today determines if we can have success in the future and a vibrant world for our children, our grandchildren and future generations.




